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## A Community Update from Mayor J.P. Hatem, MD, MPH

The month of April begins with the continuation of actively pursuing the preservation of local municipal authority over planning and zoning. A resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen on March 28th was not "sent" to our legislators, but was delivered by me in person, the next day, March 29th. I met with Senator Bill Rabon and with Rep. Charles Miller and presented

the resolution and emphasized the importance of Southport and all

municipalities having local control over planning and zoning issues and explained our opposition to multiple bills proposed in the Senate and in the House. As your Mayor, it is my job to protect and preserve our unique neighborhoods, our village atmosphere, and the quality of life for all our citizens. This is part of my dedication to you in that regard and I will protect Southport every day as Mayor. I am also working with Walter Eccard, Mayor of Shallotte, to draft a response from local Mayors.

The month of April in Southport also heralds a rejuvenation of our spirit as spring surrounds us bursting with azaleas pink, white, and red blossoms, dogwoods decorated in white, solace-filled sunsets, and seemingly endless activities for citizens and visitors.

Southport Spring Festival, sponsored by Downtown Southport Inc. (DSI), the Kiwanis Club of Southport-Oak Island, and the City of Southport, begins April 7th in Franklin Square Park. There will be over 160 craft vendors, live entertainment, food vendors, and children's activities. This is a wonderful family outing. I look forward to attending and will give the welcome on Friday at 10 am.

April begins the Budget Workshops for our city. We will hold a workshop on April 24th on the budget and we will be looking at our goals, short-term and long-term, strategically and prioritized. We will look at our Capital Improvement Plan and the important projects included and their projected costs and potential funding. Competitive salaries for recruitment and retention of employees is an important aspect of our budget discussion. If we are to provide essential services that our citizens need and the services requested, the city must have the personnel, equipment, and space to do so. The city has expanded our employee base – the Planning

Department, and Public Services with the hiring of two engineers, and this trend must continue to meet the demands of the city government. There is routine maintenance on buildings and grounds, equipment, vehicles, rights of way, parks, and cemeteries to the importance of health insurance for the employees. We will be judicious in spending and assertive in securing grants and funding for projects for our city. And note the April 11th workshop will include the noise ordinance, social media policy, cemeteries, and a review of the agenda for the April 13th Board of Aldermen meeting.

April has many special recognitions including National Library Week, April 23—29, the theme this year, "There's More to the Story"; National Public Health Week, April 3—9; World Autism Month with April 2nd –World Autism Awareness Day; Arbor Day, April 28th—the City of Southport and the Forestry Committee proclaim our live oaks and urban forests in a ceremony at Taylor Field.

This year, on April 9th, we celebrate Easter as we gather with our family and friends whether in our churches, in our homes, in our parks or wherever we may be, we join together in the Blessing that is Easter and we celebrate and are always mindful and grateful for the Blessing that is Southport.

So, I will see you in Franklin Square Park at Spring Festival, at Harper Library, on Arbor Day at Taylor field, and at our meetings as we move our city in the best way forward.

The First Lady and I wish you a Happy Easter and the Blessings of Easter to you and your family.

#### CITY OF SOUTHPORT BOARD OF ALDERMEN RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO PROPOSED LEGISLATIVE BILLS

- WHEREAS, NCGS 160A-361 authorized local governments to create, adopt, and enforce Planning and Zoning regulations within the corporate limits of the City, and the Extraterritorial Jurisdiction; and
- WHEREAS, NCGS 160D was adopted in June 2020 which and required that all municipalities adopt similar procedures, and removed a municipalities ability to regulate certain zoning requirements; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Southport adopted the current Unified Development Ordinance on September 23, 2020; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Southport has made several amendments to the UDO, based on the needs of the citizens, to help guide careful development within its Planning and Zoning jurisdiction.
- WHEREAS, there are Bills that are being considered in the NC Senate and the NC House of Representatives, that will remove authority from municipalities with regard to multijurisdictional properties, workforce housing, building plan reviews, short term rentals, and accessory dwelling units;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Aldermen for the City of Southport, hereby urge the Senate, and the House of Representatives, to deny HB 252, HB 294, HB 332, SB 290, HB 409, and SB 317; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Aldermen, and the Citizens of Southport do hereby request that the Senator Bill Rabon, and Representative Charles Miller, actively lobby for municipalities to retain their ability to create and adopt Planning and Zoning ordinances that are in compliance with their individual Land Use Plan and goals. Adopted on the 28th day of March 2023.

## Did you know...

Approximately 200,000 species of pollinators are beneficial insects such as bees, flies, beetles, wasps, and butterflies. Hummingbirds represent a small percentage of natural pollinators. Honeybees and native bees (bumblebees, carpenter bees, sweat bees, mining bees, mason bees, etc.) are critical to our food supply and pollinate about one-third of the foods we enjoy.

Bees and other pollinators are also essential to the habitats and ecosystems many wild animals rely on for food and shelter. As natural areas are cleared for development, and pesticides are sprayed, pollinator habitat is destroyed or fragmented, resulting in the loss of foraging and nesting sites. This can lead to a decline in the pollinator population.

One big way we can help pollinators is by planting forage habitat that provides nectar and pollen. Our main goal is to have plants that flower throughout the growing season, from early spring-late fall, with overlapping bloom periods.

#### Music - ALIVE and Well in Southport

What is it about music performed live? Is it the shared experience, a way to recall the past, or perhaps it is a way to calm tensions? All these and maybe just fun? Whatever it is for the listener, we have it covered in Southport. Everything from four (or more!) piece bands to the duo with a curated sound, to the single artist who prefers to play more intimate gatherings. Sometimes, the members of the various bands will do all three! But who are they? And from where do they come? Let's talk about just a few of them.

Southport Johnny and the Bizness features John Tatum on guitar, Jamie Hoover on bass and Adrian Spencer Hayden on keyboards. They are known for their rocking blues sound. These musicians can do it all and they've earned their chops. Tatum toured with the Allman Brothers and others and has a guitar sales and repair business on the side. Hoover, a much sought-out music producer, is a member of the Spongetones, a well-respected group in the power pop community that still performs in Charlotte,



and Hayden is not only a skilled musician, but he also teaches wood turning, metal sculpture, and pottery sculpture at Brunswick County Community College. These musicians also perform in the bluegrass band, Charlene and the Bluegrass Charlatans with Ken Tatum on banjo. In yet another iteration, you can find John and Spence as a duo performing for Sunday brunch and other gigs around town.



Dirk Mercer, guitarist, is a bit of a phenomenon. He toured with the heavy metal band, Farewell to Fear, some years back but was raised in West Virginia on rock and roll. He performs solo gigs on occasion but most recently can be seen with the group named Parlay. They specialize in 80s and 90s music but will still perform a Beatles tune from time to time as a crowd-pleaser. Dirk also hires out as a Host/DJ and often leads karaoke gigs around town.

As voted on by the public, LunaSea, is very popular. It has a big band sound with brass instruments but they play everything from Chicago to The Rolling Stones to Sam and Dave. With too many band members to name, Ben White (guitar, vocals) would be the first to tell you that it's a true group effort. As their website says, they're "An Energetic, Crazy, Fun Band." One of the very special things about this band is that they do fundraisers.



These are but three of MANY musicians and performing groups around town. We are fortunate to have such a depth and breadth of talent willing to share with the community. One of the true treasures of living in Southport is the helpful attitude of the people and businesses. This was never more evident to the members of the Grounds and Maintenance Crew of Caswell Avenue Community Garden this week as they began their Spring clean-up.

Back story: Our garden has about 40 raised beds rented out to members. Additionally, there are several Share Garden raised beds used to plant veggies that are given to various Southport families and former members who are no longer able to garden for themselves. Individual members often donate produce from their own beds to boost the quantity our share group is able to donate.

This giving spirit was on the mind of Grounds and Maintenance Crew Chair, Kent Simon when he was trying to solve the problem of weeds up against our raised beds. It occurred to Kent that perhaps one of our wonderful local businesses would be able to help. Enter Hoffman Eco Works! ## A Glimpse of History: Southport Street Names Mark Lives of Historic Figures

After more than 50 years spent as a legal secretary and always keeping that filing up to date, it is absolutely amazing how far behind I got with my personal and history filing. Now, while I've had to give up on my "speeching and teaching" activities as I recuperate from my recent traumatic illness, I have decided to catch up with my filing. Wow – what a job I have undertaken! But in doing so, I sure have found a lot of ideas for future "A Bit of History" columns. Today I am using one of those ideas as I write about the early and historic streets of Old Southport.

The legislative act to set up the town of Smithville (now Southport) was reluctantly introduced in the N.C. General Assembly in 1792 by Gen. Benjamin Smith, the Brunswick County legislator at that time. I say "reluctantly" because it was only after Charles Gause, a prominent Brunswick County citizen from the Winnabow area, threatened Gen. Smith by telling him he would never be elected again if he did not do so.

Mr. Gause was a good friend of Joshua Potts, who had come up with the dream of setting up a town around Fort Johnston but almost had to give up his idea because Benjamin Smith did not want to introduce such a bill.

Mr. Gause's threat worked, and the act to set up the town was ratified at a meeting of the General Assembly in New Bern on Dec. 31, 1792, thus making it possible that we here in Southport can claim that 1792 is our year!

The adopted act provided for a town to be laid out near Fort Johnston but reserved some land near the fort for possible future expansion of the fort, and it also reserved one acre of land on the waterskirts for each of the river pilots or their widows.

One hundred and fifty acres were appropriated for the town, and Joshua Potts, Benjamin Smith, William Espey Lord, Robert Howe Jr. and Charles Gause were named as commissioners to see that the town was set up.

The commissioners did not lose any time in seeing that they complied with the act, and their first meeting was held in Wilmington on Jan. 26, 1793, at the home of Amaziah Jocelin. I have no information to that effect, but I expect that Mr. Jocelin was a surveyor. A map was drawn up showing the required "streets and squares," as mentioned in the charter and the street names chosen were shown on the map.

The commissioners chose such names as Bay Street, which ran along the waterfront, and Boundary Street, which marked the western boundary of the space allotted for the town.

Other names chosen by them were Lord, Howe and Dry, which later became a laughing matter to some people, but not to this old history buff – it just made me angry to hear people tell jokes about it because of the sequence of these names on the map.

Lord Street was named for William Espey Lord, one of the named commissioners; Howe

was named for Robert Howe Sr., Revolutionary War hero and father of Commissioner Howe; and Dry Street for William Dry, collector of the Port of Brunswick.

Of course, Potts Street (Now Atlantic Ave) was named for Joshua, the commissioner who first came up with the idea to start a town around the fort.

Rhett Street was named for Col. William Rhett of Charleston, who came to the area to capture Stede Bonnett, the "gentleman pirate," as he was called. Kingsley Street was named for Mrs. Isabella Kingsley, member of another prominent Charleston family. She is sometimes associated with the naming of the Isabella grape, a local variety. I have noticed as I have studied our local history that there has always been a close connection with people from Charleston. I don't know the reason, though.

Moore Street and Nash Street were named for two prominent Brunswick Town politicians. Judge Alfred Moore and Abner Nash were the politicians, and they, too, had Charleston connections.

Brown Street was named to honor Capt. John Brown of the revenue cutter Diligence. He was the man who talked Joshua Potts into coming with him from Wilmington to visit Fort Johnston back in 1786. Thus began Joshua's dream of starting a town around the fort. I have never found any historic reason for the naming of West Street. We now have an East West Street and a West West Street, which can be confusing to people new to our town. Most of us old-timers just take it for granted.

Personally, I think those first commissioners should have named it Gause Avenue, to honor Charles Gause, the influential politician who threatened Benjamin Smith into getting the legislation passed. Although Mr. Gause was one of the first commissioners, he was not conceited enough to insist that a street be named for him. Like most of the other commissioners, he bought several of the first lots that were sold. I don't know if he ever lived here, but one of his descendants, Charles E. Gause, lived here for many years and was an outstanding and contributing citizen. Some of his descendants still live here.

There are many others stories that can be told about Old Southport streets, and I will probably share some of those with you later. Right now, I have to go wash some dishes, so you can see I must be improving. Yesterday I even went riding with a friend without going to the hospital or the doctor's office. So keep praying for me, please.

#### **Coffee Cake Cookies**

#### **Ingredients**

#### **Cinnamon Dough**

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup brown sugar
- l egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 1/2 cups flour

#### Streusel

- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/3 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- pinch of salt

#### lcing

- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1 tbsp milk
- splash of vanilla



#### Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 350 F. To make the dough, combine the butter, oil and brown sugar. Mix for a couple minutes until it is smooth. The mixture should be lighter in color and fluffy. Add the egg and vanilla and mix again. Add the remaining ingredients and mix until just combined.
- To make the streusel, combine all the ingredients in a bowl and mix with a spoon or your hand. Start with 1/3 cup of flour. The mixture should stick together, but should also crumble when you run it through your fingers. If it isn't crumbling, add 1 tbsp additions of flour until it crumbles.
- Using a large cookie scoop, scoop a ball of dough onto a lined baking sheet. Using the back of your cookie scoop or your fingers, make an indent on the top of the dough. Sprinkle a couple tablespoons of the streusel on the top of the cookie, into the indent.
- Bake the cookies at 350 for 10-12 minutes. While they are baking, make the icing. Combine the powdered sugar, milk, and vanilla in a small bowl and whisk until it's smooth and runny. Once the cookies have cooled slightly, drizzle on lots of icing! Enjoy!




