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A Community Update from Mayor J.P. Hatem, MD, MPH

July is here, summer is in full bloom and the North Carolina Fourth of July Festival takes precedence as we celebrate the glory of liberty and freedom that is proclaimed on this Independence Day. It is a homecoming for Southport so cherish the memories from the Naturalization Ceremony, the Fire Fighters Competition, the parade, the fireworks, and the

gathering of family and friends that this holiday in part represents. We remember our military who protect our freedom as we wear and display red, white, and blue, in their honor and to commemorate July 4th, 1776.

July 1st is also the beginning of the new fiscal year for the City of Southport. This year's budget is revenue neutral and the ad valorem tax rate was decreased to 0.275 per \$100 dollars of assessed property value from a tax rate of 0.3956. This budget adds infrastructure capital improvement projects, and requested city staff from an additional planner, paramedics, to plans for plant watering and maintenance for our cemeteries. This budget and tax rate added an additional \$459,000 to be used for the capital projects. This budget includes funding for a master plan for the city and is strategic, prioritized, and will meet the immediate responsibilities as well as future endeavors.

We celebrate the Garrison on Fort Johnston that is adorned with red, white, and blue, and I want to thank Director Tom Stanley and the Public Services Department and the Southport Garden Club for this wonderful patriotic display. We celebrate Southport native and N.C. Fourth of

NC 4th of July Festival, a History

This years festival is from June 30th-July 4th

The history of Southport's Fourth of July Festival celebration was first recorded in a newspaper in 1795.

At that time, the crew on ships lying at anchor in the harbor would discharge salutes from their cannons beginning at daybreak and lasting throughout the day. Ships officers and town officials would share some companionship and toast the young nation's independence during what was known as the "Festival of Free Men."

The festival evolved over the ensuing years. By the 1950s its name had been changed to the "Live Oak Festival" and it was celebrated with parades, balls, and queens.

In the 1960s the foundation of today's festival was born. In 1962 the newly organized Southport Jaycees, in their search of a ways and means project, held the raffle on the evening of July 4. A lucky winner would walk away with a boat. The raffle was held at what was known locally as the "Cedar Bench; today that landmark on the waterfront is called "Whittler's Bench."

Another newly organized civic club, the Southport Junior Woman's started the tradition of the "Arts Festival" in 1963. With the enthusiasm and excitement of Southport residents and tourists, the true community patriotic spirit came alive with the celebration of the now-recognized Fourth of July parade in 1964.

In 1972, the festival was incorporated by the Secretary of State as the "North Carolina Fourth of July Festival, Inc.," a non-profit organization. Along with its board of directors, the professional staff at the Southport-Oak Island Area Chamber of Commerce, and many volunteer workers it has continued to grow into what it is today.

This three- to four-day festival has no counterpart anywhere. Hosted by this little seacoast town of happy and hospitable people, the festival annually brings joy and an intense feeling of patriotism to the residents and visitors from every state in the union.

Since 1996, a Naturalization Ceremony has been incorporated into the N.C. Fourth of July Festival and administered by what is now the United States Department of Homeland Security U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS).

Let's talk about SHADE



The 4th of July – it's only a few days away and before you know it Southport will be inundated with visitors here to enjoy our fair town and all the planned festivities. As always, it's going to be a grand celebration, and more than likely, it's going to be HOT. We're going to be looking at temperatures near 90 (according to the forecast) and that means that what I often call "Southport's most valuable asset" – SHADE is going to be in high demand. In this newsletter, we've covered a wide variety of topics related to trees and their importance to Southport's

beauty, health, and safety but we've never talked about that one thing that is constant day in and day out which makes walking down our sidewalks or sitting on our front porch so much more enjoyable, and that is the shade that our canopy of trees provides us.

We've all done it out on a walk on a hot summer day – we follow the shade. Why? Because in the shade we are protected from the glare of the summer sun and temperatures can be as much as 25 degrees cooler than when we're unprotected from those glaring sun rays. Combine that with our "salubrious breezes" and even the hottest of summer days can seem almost tolerable.

SOMEONE IS SITTING IN THE SHADE TODAY BECAUSE SOMEONE PLANTED A TREE A LONG TIME AGO.

There are economic benefits to shade as well – having trees provide shade to our houses can lower your power bill considerably (as much

as 35%!) as we run our air conditioning, so there's some relief to your pocketbook as well as to the temperature. Health benefits – you bet. Being in the shade of a tree can reduce your exposure to UV rays by up to 75%, thus reducing the likelihood of any heat-related injury ranging from sunburn to heat stroke. Your body is less stressed being cooler and therefore



your mood is improved. Shade can also protect your eyesight from glare, which can protect you from everything from headaches to actual eye injury from long term exposure.

So, back to my original point - the 4th of July. When you're out and about, take advantage of the shade and protect yourself from the sun when you can. Take a look around and see where people congregate; it's going to be under the canopy of one of our magnificent live oaks. The shade that our trees provide us is not

something that we often consciously think about, but I suspect on Tuesday all of us will be looking for a little respite from the heat that our trees so effectively provide. Enjoy the Holiday!

Consult your vet for medication if your pet gets particularly frightened by fireworks and loud noises



June has been a busy month for Southport's Beautification Committee. During our workday held on Saturday, June 3rd, volunteers could be found at Waterfront Park staining picnic tables, swings, and the trashcan surrounds. These are all used daily by residents and visitors, so we wanted to make sure that they continued to look great.

And if there is one thing that requires constant attention and that's the many gardens that are throughout our City that Beautification Volunteers help maintain. This includes the garden in front of the Fire Department substation on



East Nash Street, as well as gardens found at the round-a-bout and the Bonnet Monument on East Moore Street, the Garrison Lawn, Waterfront Park, and the Pollinator Garden located on East Leonard Street. These were all tackled on the Beautification Workday by the many Beautification Volunteers. We are thankful for the efforts of many who come out to help keep our City looking beautiful.



The Beautification Committee, under the leadership of Ken Geiman, has also built a new wheelchair-accessible picnic table which is located at Taylor Field. We hope to build more of these and put them in different locations for folks to use while having a picnic and enjoying our salubrious breezes.

Our month was wrapped up with members of the Beautification Committee taking on the honorable task of end-of-day lowering of the flag at Waterfront Park.

This is always well attended and we enjoy doing this.

While Beautification does not have workdays scheduled during July and August, we'll still be doing work around the City in preparation for the many visitors that we'll see on the 4th. Speaking of the 4th, we hope you have a great one.







Caswell Avenue Community Garden

The Share Garden Team

At the Caswell Avenue Community Garden [CACG], individual gardeners pay \$40 yearly to garden a 4' x 8' raised bed. These funds go to maintaining the garden as a whole: mulching common areas, mowing, weeding, and the like. This constant maintenance is done in teams. This month we want to feature our Share Garden Team and the excellent work they do.

Our Share Garden Team plants and maintains two large beds. Each of these areas





is approximately three times the size of the individual gardens. The team decides what and how much to plant. They either purchase starter plants or sow from seed. They weed, nurture, and harvest as a team every Tuesday morning. Once harvested, the produce is weighed and cataloged. Veggies are then divided up, placed in paper bags, and delivered to local residents. A log is maintained to ensure that distribution is made equitably amongst those receiving the produce.

At CACG we put COMMUNITY first and our Share Garden is a good example of this. But this community commitment extends beyond the

two large shared gardens. Often, individual gardeners are absent for a period of time or they grow more than they can consume. Their excess produce, given to the Share Team, helps boost the harvest so we have even more to give. Each year, CAGG provides many, many pounds of produce to the Southport Community as a whole. Already this year, we have distributed over 75 lbs of veggies. That's a LOT considering the early harvest consists of mostly leafy green vegetables.

We hope that you will peek in on our garden if you are ever on Caswell Avenue behind Brunswick Community College. Talk to a gardener and see what's growing!

A Glimpse of History: 1845 Fourth of July Celebration

from Southport Historical Society Newsletters, The Whittler's Bench, June 4, 1987

The following is an article found in the Wilmington Chronicle for Wednesday, July 9, 1845 that Susie Carson Published in Whittler's Bench

Why should the good people of Wilmington (I might include the Carolinas) so frequently, en masse, at risk of life and limb and emptying of purses into the bargain, migrate so far abroad for health and recreation, when they can have it for almost turning around, at Smithville? To which, from the Capitals of the Carolinas (both in the center of their respective States), persons can be transported, now, in about 24 hours and from either metropolises in less than half the time. And then that a place to get to, at so little expense! Such air, such society, such accommodations, I, who have been somewhat a traveller have ner yet, before, had the good fortune to meet with such happy combination. A place, shaded, and yet open to the sea – retired and yet, from the daily arrivals of the Steamboats, possessing nearly all the advantages of the city with almost none of the inconveniences; no mosquitoes, no sand flies, no severe diseases, no dust, no din, no confusion; I had almost averred no blight, no mildew, ever disfigures the fair face of Smithville. A smiling Village, indeed!

Sweet Smithville! loveliest village of the sea, Fond memory, often shall return to thee.

But here, we have the 'Fourth of July' at Smithville – for Smithville we can tell ye, is as patriotic a little place as in all the land. And would be about the last to be backing out from a hearty celebration of the 'Glorious Fourth'; and so how she did make her bells ring again, and her cannons roar, as if the very Mexicans were in sight and colors were flying from every big and little mast head, and the dogs did bark, and the children scream to usher in that day. At the hour appointed in the morning, the procession marched from the Garrison to the Church. A fine show did 'Uncle Sam's men' make of it, as did the 'Thirteen Young States' – Sweet sisterly band, may they indeed be united, and every happy and prosperous in their union.

The Declaration of Independence was read by Mr. R. M. McRackan, with fine tone and emphasis, and the excellent oration of Capt. Taylor, of the U. S. Army, was delivered in a manner calm and dignified. The Patriotic songs of the choirs seemed to be quite in-spiring. Old men felt like 'shouldering their staffs and showing how fields were won', and young men like proving the temper of their maiden blades upon the Country's foe. The Garrison dinner at the Fort went off, in prime style. How could it otherwise On the good old cold water plan! But what a whirring and whizzing and sound of pipe and drum and tabor have we here! 'The Excursion boat is coming' rings out simultaneously from a thousand voices. 'She's here!, She's here!' With pennons streaming, and flags flapping, and colors flying, and she appearing herself as if really concious of a holiday – – at least she's in a broad grin! for a dense mass of darkies on deck, are all at once displaying their ivories and 'turning up de yeller ob der eyes.' What a motley crew she diseinbaques! 'Black spirits and white', blue spirits and grey; and by the capers some of them cut we fear a due of rather undue proportions of 'the ardent'. What a pity that our noble Steamers do not sail under the

Temperance Flag. Then there could be little reprehensible to the severest moralist in a scene, once a year, of Holiday hilarity like this; but it is to be regretted exceedingly, that there were cases there degrading to humanity. Oh why, when there is anything proper or pleasant or profitable going on must Satan be allowed to come. Also with his attendant train, disorder, discord and degradation? The great cause of this evil, (I cannot mince the matter), THE BAR should be removed altogether, ere these excursions be unattended with danger, or unalloyed in their enjoyment. The attraction of the evening fireworks at the Fort, thinned 'the ship's company' of some of the most riotous. One of the 'half-seas over' ones I heard reciferating just as the boat pushed off, 'I won't no how, leave them there Firey rigamarole things, they'll be after showing off at night.' Then away we went from pleasant Smithville, the obliging Captain giving us a sail by the 'new Fort', and the 'Light-house' and affording us the sublime spectacle of the broad Atlantic, which here begins to spread itself into its grand immensity.

'Arriving in town in the cool of the evening, just before the 'sober-livered' time, we were ushered in by a merry feu de joie, while a multitude of happy mortals shouted out our welcome back to Wilmington."

(signed) A Return Passenger Wilmington, N. C., July 5, 1845

On July 2, 1845, the following advertisement had appeared in the Chronicle:

Excursion to Smithville Steamboat will leave one of our lower wharves for Smithville at or about 10 o'clock A. H. on the 4th inst. Fare \$1.00 including collation.

Red, White and Blue Salsa

For the dressing:

- 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 2-3 teaspoons honey start with 2 and add more if needed
- 1 medium jalapeno finely chopped
- 1 small clove of garlic finely minced
- ¼ teaspoon salt

For the salsa:

- ¾ cups diced jicama
- 1/2 cup finely diced white onion
- 1 cup diced fresh strawberries
- 1 cup fresh blueberries
- 1/2 cup finely chopped fresh cilantro

Instructions

- 1. Combine all ingredients for the dressing in a small bowl. Stir well till combined. Set aside.
- 2. Set aside 1 tablespoon of the chopped cilantro.
- 3. Just before serving, combine all salsa ingredients (except reserved cilantro) in a medium size bowl. Pour dressing over and mix gently to combine. Sprinkle with a bit of the reserved cilantro and serve.

Note: Use a veggie chopper, it chops veggies into uniform pieces in minutes. It's great for jicama, carrots, potatoes, onion, celery, etc.


