Holiday Fire Safety Tips

Our holiday traditions can increase the risk of home fires. Learn how to stay safe while you celebrate.

From Thanksgiving to the New Year, it's time to enjoy our favorite holiday traditions, celebrating around the table, and making new memories with friends and family. To ensure that the festivities are both happy and safe, here are some useful holiday season fire safety tips from your fire department. Cooking and Baking



No holiday celebration would be complete without a feast but be sure to take precautions against kitchen fires when you're cooking and baking. That includes keeping children and flammable items such as grocery bags and kitchen towels away from the stove and oven. Clean up greasy spills as you go to remove another fire hazard. If you're deep

frying a turkey, keep the fryer well away from structures and trees, make sure your turkey is fully thawed, and follow the manufacturer's instructions for your fryer. Never wear loose fitting clothing and do not cook when you are drowsy, using alcohol, or taking medication.

Christmas Trees
Old-fashioned Christmas celebrations featured wax candles on live tree branches - inside homes! Today we know better but risks still remain. If your family prefers real trees, be sure to water yours every day because dry needles and wood catch fire more easily. Go ahead and use many



strings of light, but don't plug more than 3 strings into each other (opt for a surge protector instead). Discard light strings that are worn or broken. And be sure to always unplug the lights before leaving the house or going to sleep.



Menorah or Kinara
It's possible to buy electric menorahs and kinaras, but if you prefer

traditional candles, you can still celebrate Hanukkah and Kwanzaa in a fire smart way. Keep flammable items, including curtains and holiday decorations, at least 3 feet away from your candles. Place your menorah or kinara on a non-flammable surface to catch the melting candle wax, such as a

tray lined with aluminum foil. Never leave lit candles unattended.

Fireplaces

Nothing takes the chill off winter holidays like the light and heat of a fire on your hearth. Just be sure to keep "fuel" – from wrapping paper to rugs to clothing – at least three feet away from the flames. Use a fire screen to keep embers and logs from escaping. Lastly, make sure all embers are fully extinguished before you turn in for the night.



Fireworks

We usually talk about firework safety for the Fourth of July, but many New Year celebrations also include fireworks. If you'll be setting off fireworks at home, choose a location away from buildings and trees. Be sure your spectators, including children and pets, stay well back. Keep a supply of water or tire extinguisher at hand. If you live in an area that's experiencing a drought,

consider cancelling the show this year - a stray spark that lands on dry grass or leaves can lead to a wildfire. Remember any firework that leaves the ground is illegal in the state of North Carolina. It is best practice to leave the fireworks to the professionals.

Celebrations, holidays, and traditions are always a special treat. It is a wonderful time for family and friends to fellowship and share the joy of the season. Don't let your special time be ruined by a fire or emergency that can be prevented. Landscaping – be "Fire wise"

I was recently on a trip "out west" to southwestern North Carolina and during the trip there were two major wildfires, and several smaller ones, affecting communities throughout several counties. Here in Southport, the event that we typically spend our time preparing for is hurricanes – but we probably should spend at least a little time thinking about the possibility of fire.

We are all aware that for the last several years, we have had drought conditions down here on the coast for several months at a time. Those fires happening in SW North Carolina are a direct result of the extreme drought conditions that they are currently experiencing. When the conditions are right, it doesn't take much to start a conflagration that can quickly get out of control when vegetative matter is bone dry, humidity is low, and the wind is blowing. We have all seen the devastating results of major fires out in California and the western US, but North Carolina typically ranks in the top 5 for the number of wildfires we experience each year; we all remember this past June we had the "Pulp Road" fire in the Green Swamp that was only about 20 miles from here. While it's unlikely that here in Southport we could experience a fire on the scale of those in California as we really aren't in the "WUI" (Wildland Urban Interface) - but could we experience a fire that could impact one or a few of our residents? Absolutely.

North Carolina, like many other states, has a "Fire Wise" program, which helps people identify ways to reduce the likelihood that wildfire could affect their residence. As an example, here in Southport, one of the most utilized types of mulching in our landscape is pine straw. Pine straw is readily available, looks nice, and is relatively cheap. However, when it's dry, as in drought conditions, pine straw has a high potential for ignition. Landscape companies like to pile it high, but if that straw is piled directly adjacent to your home, you're creating a potential hazard. Pine straw, leaves, or any other vegetative matter should always be cleared away from around the foundation of your home. Any woody plants should not become overgrown and physically touch your house; they just provide a path for fire to reach the structure. Gutters and eaves should be cleaned regularly – an ember from a fire can travel up to a mile in the right conditions, and if it lands in a gutter full of leafy debris the results can be devastating.

A Fire-Resistant Home

By all means, we should continue to landscape with trees, shrubs, and plants to keep Southport beautiful. But as we experience annual drought conditions more frequently we should undertake that landscaping in such a way that we are not laying the foundation for potential disaster. I would encourage everyone to at least take a look at the "Resist Wildfire NC" site to be aware of how a few small changes can ensure the safety of your home – and those in it.

Southport Beautification Committee

November was a busy month for Southport's Beautification Committee Volunteers!

It began with the Beautification Workday on Saturday, November 8th, where a number of volunteers cleaned up the Steed Bonnet Memorial as well as the roundabout on E. Moore. Volunteers also readied the many Christmas trees, checking their condition and ensuring that all of the bulbs were working. These were then placed in the various Parks by Public Services.

During the month, there were also volunteers working in the Pollinator Garden in Lowe-White Park. Plus, the benches on E. Nash Street received a badly needed coat of stain.

Also, during the month, volunteers prepped the wreaths that decorate our streets by replacing all of the bulbs with brighter white lights around the sailboats while adding colored lights around the edges. 6,000 bulbs later and they were ready to go. They were then picked up by Public Services and distributed around the City. BEMC (Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation) then installed them overnight.

Garland was also added to the various signs around the City giving them a festive look. Then, of course, there were Beautification volunteers assisting with the installation of the City's Christmas Tree at Waterfront Park. Truthfully, the heavy lifting was taken care of by the great crew from Public Services and BEMC.

We're so very thankful for the many people who come out and help bring the Christmas Spirit to our fine City.

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A Glimpse of History:

A Southport Christmas by Boyce Spencer

Christmas in Southport during the 30's and early 40's was always looked forward to with much anticipation and great expectations. Probably best of all was that school was let out until after new years.

Our Christmas tree was always given to us by a friend or family member until I reached the age when I could go in the woods and cut one myself. The tree was a cedar and the small needles would penetrate your skin and cause a rash of sorts that was very uncomfortable. Decorating the tree was just as bad and the removal of the decorations at the end of the season was even worse because the needles had dried and become even more of a menace. The lights we first used were the kind that when a single bulb burned out the whole strand went out. Finding the culprit light took considerable time as each bulb had to be replaced with a good one until the strand lit up. Mama was tired of this yearly ritual and purchased several strings of outdoor lights. We used these on the tree for years. After mama passed away I still made use of the lights until they got misplaced after lending them to someone for use at a dance. The lights were blue with a pink center. Not very Christmas sounding but they were pretty. The tree was always in the same corner of the living room and tied to the walls to keep it from leaning. Most of the time the base of the tree was kept in a bucket of dirt so it could be watered from time to time.

Next to the tree was the fireplace with the stockings hung with care from the mantle. Santa filled the stockings with fruits and nuts and maybe a small toy for me in my stocking. For some reason I always got mama a bible for a present. She must have had more bibles than any woman in town. Evening in Paris perfume was popular and I made sure my sister Evelyn got a bottle for Christmas. It came in a small blue bottle with a tassel on top. The cost of the perfume was probably in the neighborhood of 25 cents a gallon. She pretended she liked it and that was all that counted.

Some of the houses around town were decorated but nothing like the houses of today. Carolers would come by in the evenings and sing the songs of the season. My favorite group was Erving Brown and some of his friends. They were good and reminded me of the Mills Brothers. Seems like folks don't have time for this anymore.

Where the new Baptist Church is today there was a large cedar tree and Santa Claus would be there on Christmas Eve to hand out gifts to the young children. The gifts were for the most part fruits and nuts and hard candy. Coming into Southport on Howe Street one was treated to a canopy of multicolored lights strung over the street and seeing them from a distance they looked very impressive, like a solid cover of lights. A white Christmas was always wished for but never happened. The only White Christmas then was from Bing Crosby.

Slow-Cooker Pork Shoulder

With Brown Sugar & Balsamic Glaze https://www.southernliving.com/recipes/sweet-potato-rolls

Ingredients:

- 4 pounds pork shoulder (boneless pork butt)
- 4 cloves garlic, grated
- 2 teaspoons ground sage 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 4 bay leaves
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons mustard powder
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch

Instructions



- 1. Put the pork shoulder, garlic, sage, salt, pepper, bay leaves, and water into a slow cooker and smoosh around with your hands. Cook on High for 4 hours.
- 2. In a measuring cup, whisk together the brown sugar, balsamic vinegar, soy sauce, mustard powder, and cornstarch. Add to the slow cooker and cook for another hour.
- 3. Carve pork against the grain into individual portions and serve with roasted carrots or white rice. **Sheet-Pan Cranberry Crisp**

Ingredients:

Cranberry Filling

- 3 pounds cranberries (fresh or thawed from frozen)
- 11/4 cups light brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

Streusel Topping

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 12/3 cups rolled (aka old-fashioned) oats
- 11/4 cups light brown sugar
- 11/2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 11/4 cups (2½ sticks) unsalted butter, cubed, at a cool room temperature

Instructions

- 1. Position a rack in the middle of the oven and cover the rack below with foil (to catch any drips). Heat the oven to 400°F.
- 2. Add all of the cranberry filling ingredients to a large bowl and toss with your hands until the sugar starts to dissolve. Spread the mixture into a rimmed 18x13-inch sheet
- 3. To make the streusel, combine the flour, oats, sugar, and salt in a large bowl and stir. Add the butter and incorporate by hand, pinching with your fingers, until the mixture resembles wet sand that clumps when squeezed. Evenly distribute the streusel on top of the cranberries, smushing it into clumps along the way.
- 4. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes, until the cranberries are bubbling around the edges and the streusel is golden brown.
- 5. Let cool for at Teast 10 minutes before serving.
