OVERVIEW AND HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OPERATIONAL REPORT AND SITE MASTER PLAN PROCESS FOR FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

Franklin Square Park is one of seventeen public parks and recreation facilities, areas, and parks operated by the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department. Franklin Square Park is approximately 3 acres in size and its main entrance is located at the corner of N Howe Street and E West Street. Franklin Square Park would generally be classified as a "Passive Park," with its main basic amenities including a Stage/Bandstand, an old well with a gazebo, benches, a ballast stone wall, natural footpaths, live oak trees, azalea bushes, camelia bushes, and other types of natural vegetation. There are no active recreation amenities such as a playground, swings, athletic fields and courts, or indoor recreation structures. It is also a beautiful venue for events such as festivals, concerts, community and individual gatherings, walking, sitting, reading, meditating, reflecting, etc.

Unfortunately, Franklin Square Park has started to show signs of its age, and its trees, flowering plants, shrubbery, and natural vegetation are in need of maintenance and in some cases replacement. It is the purpose of this report to assess and analyze the present condition and uses of Franklin Square Park and then make recommendations to improve and enhance the current condition and uses and guide the future operation,

management, and maintenance of Franklin Square Park via a Franklin Square Park Operational Report and a Site Master Plan.

At the heart of this **Operational Report** is an evaluation and assessment of the question most recently addressed in an Editorial in The State Port Pilot published on Wednesday, September 6, 2023—"Should Franklin Square Park be a showplace of southern beauty, or should it be a showground and continue to host more and more events and expositions?" This question to some extent oversimplifies the dilemma facing the City of Southport administration in general and the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department in specific. Possibly, the real question that should be asked and answered is "Can Franklin Square Park be a showplace of southern beauty and a showground of recreation and community programs, services, events, and activities to include scaled-down festivals, markets, and other types of controlled community and individual gatherings?"

It is definitely in everyone's best interest that the City of Southport Mayor and Board of Alderman, the City of Southport Municipal Administration, the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department, the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, the City of Southport Beautification Committee, the City of Southport Historic Preservation Commission, the Downtown Southport, Inc. (DSI), the City of Southport Forestry Committee, the Friends of Franklin, and all Southport citizens and organizations work together to save and preserve the history, health, beauty, appeal, and functionality of Franklin Square Park.

A current assessment of Franklin Square Park indicates that the primary reason for the problems associated with the Park is a *general lack of maintenance* over the last several years. Many of the live oak trees had become diseased and stressed, the natural pedestrian footpaths had disappeared, and most of the Park was and is in need of enhancements, improvements, and attention—maintenance and repairs. It must also not be forgotten or overlooked that live oak trees, azaleas, and camelias like all trees and shrubbery have a natural life expectancy and will eventually die and have to be replaced. The key is to provide regular maintenance of the trees and shrubbery to sustain them as long as possible.

The goal of this **Operational Report** and **Franklin Square Park Site Master Plan** is to develop a plan and process for returning **Franklin Square Park** to and maintaining **Franklin Square Park** at its best possible condition while ensuring the safe, practical, and viable use of the **Park** for future programs, services, events, activities, markets, and other types of controlled community and individual gatherings.

FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

History of Franklin Square Park—Franklin Square "The Oak Grove" Plaque

Franklin Park—"The Grove" was set aside for the people in January 1793, a few weeks after Smithville (later renamed Southport) was granted a charter, the new town's commissioners set aside one large square to be used only by civic, religious, or fraternal organizations. The northwest corner remained an open area, known originally as "The Oak Grove," and later Franklin Square Park.

Masons, Methodists, Baptists and Basketball

Today, the southwest corner is occupied by Southport Baptist Church, built in 1988 and its predecessor (now a chapel) built in 1871. The bell of the old church remains on the church lawn. On the southeast corner is Trinity United Methodist Church, built in 1889. A predecessor sanctuary, built around 1814, was purchased by the congregation of Mr. Carmel A.M.E. church, and moved to the corner of St. George and Lord Streets.

Between the Baptist and Methodist churches, facing Nash Street is the Masonic Building constructed in the 1850s. It was previously used as a school and during both World Wars as a recreational facility for servicemen. Wings were added to the building to accommodate a gymnasium and even a bowling alley. To the west is a building that formerly served as the city fire station, and at one time, city hall was located there.

On the east side facing Atlantic Avenue, are a senior citizens center and a gymnasium. An outdoor basketball court with a wooden floor and bleachers sat behind these buildings at one time.

Arts and Azaleas

In the center of the square stands the Franklin Square Art Gallery, constructed as a school in 1904. Used as a meeting place for a fraternal group, it was also used as a place for worship services by local Catholics. The Associated Artists of Southport currently use the building as a gallery and educational facility.

Between the gallery and the gymnasium stands a tight cluster of four oaks, known as the Four Sisters, a favorite of children at play since at least the early 1900s. In the Depression of the 1930s the Works Progress Administration (WPA) added azaleas and other amenities, and the Oak Grove formally became a park. At that time, a portion of Dry Street became the present walkway through the park.




History of Franklin Square Park—Franklin Square "The Grove" Plaque

Site for this public park was given to the town of Smithville, which was named in his honor by Governor Benjamin Smith. His legacy provided that land in this square be used for educational, fraternal, religious and recreational purposes.

The giant live oaks which canop Franklin Square are hundrends of years old. "The Four Sisters" behind the City Hall, have been played in by children for many generations. Thousands of camellias and azaleas have been planted to beautify the park, and in late winter and early spring the park becomes a fairyland of color.

The walls around the area were built of ballas stone from sailing ships which more than one hundred years ago came into the harbor at Southport for cargo. The old fashioned pump is a relic of bygone days and supplies cool, pure water from a deep well. Legend has it that one who drinks from this well will return for another visit to this community.



PUBLIC INPUT PROCESS

A significant amount of time and effort were expended to identify and assess the expressed desires, wishes, needs, and interests of the citizens of the City of Southport regarding **Franklin Square Park**. To this end, the citizens of the City of Southport participated directly, tangibly, and actively in the process in the following manner:

• Two (2) Public Meetings were facilitated—July 17, 2024, and July 27, 2024. The July 17, 2024, public meeting was held at the Southport Community Building starting at 5 pm and approximately twenty-six (26) individuals participated. The July 27, 2024, public meeting was held at Franklin Square Park starting at 4 pm and approximately forty-one (41) individuals participated (Appendix A and Appendix B).





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Eight (8) key Franklin Square Park stakeholders were identified and participated in a Focus Group Discussion Session on June 6, 2024—Ms. Cheryl Daniel, Ms. Emily Humphreys, Ms. Stephanie Jackson, Ms. Stephanie Jenkins, Mr. Scott Len, Ms. Peggy Popelars, Ms. Jeanne Potter, and Ms. Emma Thomas (Appendix C)

PERTINENT PUBLIC INPUT SUMMARY FROM THE PUBLIC MEETINGS (2)

- For Franklin Square Park to succeed, it must be well maintained
- Lack of maintenance is the reason Franklin Square Park is in the poor shape it is in today
- If the Park is properly maintained, everything included in the Draft Site Master Plan can be successfully accomplished
- ➡ The Paths and Walkways within Franklin Square Park need to be better defined
 and constructed of permeable pavement or pervious pavers so they will be
 handicapped accessible
- Like the idea of mulching the Bare Dirt Spots
- Grass needs to be grown in the areas that are now Bare Dirt Spots
- Some of the events, activities, festivals, markets, and community gatherings that have been held in Franklin Square Park in the past need to be moved to other venues and there needs to be requirements and restrictions on those events, activities, festivals, markets, and community events that are held in Franklin Square Park
- ♣ Only plants and trees native to the City of Southport area should be planted in Franklin Square Park such as Live Oaks, Flowering Dogwoods, Southern Wax Myrtles, Azaleas, and Camellias
- ☐ The Stage/Bandstand needs to be totally replaced and moved to a different location within Franklin Square Park
- Excellent idea to install a fence barrier around the "Four Sisters"
- Like the idea of moving the Stage/Bandstand to the south end of the Park
- ♣ Do not like the idea of moving the Stage/Bandstand to the south end of the Park
- Like the idea of installing permeable walkways/pathways
- Like the idea of defining the Park with formal entranceways
- Like the idea of blocking the informal entranceways with shrubbery screening

PERTINENT PUBLIC INPUT SUMMARY FROM THE NEEDS ASSESSMENT SURVEY

One thousand one hundred and fifty-four (1,154) individuals responded to the City of Southport Franklin Square Park Needs Assessment Survey and 588 individuals or 51% of the respondents "Pay City of Southport Property Taxes." Five hundred and twenty-nine (529) or approximately 46% of those responding identified themselves as a "Full-Time/Permanent Resident; own my own home; and pay City of Southport property taxes." Twenty-eight (28) or approximately 2% of those responding identified themselves as a "Full-Time/Permanent Resident; rent/lease my place of residence." Fifty-nine 59) or approximately 5% of those responding identified themselves as a "Part-Time Resident; own my home; and pay City of Southport property taxes." Four (4) or approximately 1% of those responding identified themselves as a "Part-Time Resident; rent/lease my place of residence." Two hundred and eighty-seven (287) or approximately 25% of the 483 of those responding identified themselves as "Live in the 28461-zip code, but NOT within the city limits or Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of the City of Southport." Ninety-two (92) or approximately 8% of those responding identified themselves as a "Tourist/Visitor; live within 1-hour drive of Southport." Forty-five (45) or approximately 4% of those responding identified themselves as a "Tourist/Visitor; live outside a 1-hour drive of Southport." And one hundred and ten (110) or approximately 10% of those responding identified themselves as "Other." (Appendix E)



- The survey asked, "Why do/would you or any members of your household visit/use Franklin Square Park? (PLEASE MARK ONLY UP TO FIVE)," the top responses in priority order are Enjoy the Shade Trees (57%), Attend Concerts (53%), Enjoy Nature/Outdoors (49%), Enjoy the Azaleas/Flowers (47%), Attend Social Events (46%), and Attend Cultural Events (43%). (Q10) (Appendix H)
- The survey asked, "Which of the following <u>features/amenities presently found</u> <u>at Franklin Square Park do you approve of</u>? (PLEASE MARK ALL THAT APPLY)," the top responses in priority order are Shade Trees/Oak Trees (94%), Azalea Bushes (91%), Benches (91%), Trash Receptacles (79%), Pathways (76%), and Gazebo and Stage/Bandstand (74%). (Q11) (Appendix J)

- The survey asked, "What do you believe are the three (3) major maintenance and management issues facing Franklin Square Park? (PLEASE MARK ONLY THREE)," the top responses in priority order are Need to Restore/Protect Nature (53%), Park Not Well Maintained (36%), Trees are in Poor Condition (34%), Need More Markets/Vendor Opportunities (22%), Azaleas are in Poor Condition (21%), and Too Many Markets/Vendor Opportunities (20%). (Q12) (Appendix L)
- The survey asked, "Which of the following best describes your vision for Franklin Square Park? (PLEASE MARK ALL THAT APPLY)," the top responses in priority order are Destination Park for Residents (67%), Venue for Special Events/Concerts (54%), Cultural/Historic Park (52%), Venue for Special Events/Festivals (49%), Destination Park for Visitors (47%), Venue for Special Events such as Community Gatherings (46%), and Arts Park or Arts in the Park (46%) (Q13) (Appendix N)
- The survey asked, "In your opinion, what are the five (5) most important amenities that should be found at Franklin Square Park? (PLEASE MARK ONLY FIVE)," the top responses in priority order are Shade Trees/Oak Trees, (84%), Azaleas/Flowering Shrubbery (74%), Benches (73%), Foot Paths (46%), and Bandstand (45%) (Q14) (Appendix P)
- The survey asked, "Please state any additional improvements/enhancements at Franklin Square Park that would improve/enhance your overall parks and recreation experience," the top responses in priority order are 1) An Approach to Operation and Management which includes Proper and Regular Maintenance, Improved Landscaping, and Scaled Back Use and Provision of Festivals/Events/Activities within Franklin Square Park—213 responses, 2) Basic Improvements and Enhancements to the Existing Amenities and Proper and Regular Maintenance of Franklin Square Park—175 responses, 3) An Approach to Operation and Management which includes Proper and Regular Maintenance, **Improved** Landscaping, but Removal of all Festivals/Events/Activities from Franklin Square Park to Other Venues in the City of Southport-102 responses, 4) The Protection and Maintenance of the Trees in Franklin Square Park—73 responses, and 5) The Provision of Safe, Functional, and Defined Permeable Material Foot Paths with Franklin Square Park—51 responses (Q15) (Appendix R)



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PERTINENT INPUT SUMMARY FROM THE TREE RISK ASSESSMENT REPORT

- ↓ The City of Southport agreed to complete a Level 3 Advanced Assessment on twenty-two (22) live oaks (*Quercus virginiana*) located in the Franklin Square Park in Southport, North Carolina between January 2 5, 2024
- ♣ Three (3) options were presented to mitigate the risk associated with the 22 live oak trees

> Option One:

- Recommended to remove live oaks #3, #24, and #25 entirely to remove the risk of root, root collar, trunk, crown, and branch failure. Grind the resulting stumps and back-fill the holes
- Recommended that the remaining nineteen (19) trees be pruned to remove dead branches 2 inches and larger in diameter, reduce the spread and weight of their crowns, and thinned so that winds easily move through the canopies, reducing the likelihood of branch, stem, or root failure
- Recommended to install cables in live oaks #35, # 43, #44, #45, and #46 to provide support to co-dominant stems
- Recommended to install lightning protection systems in live oaks #5, #8, #16, #22, #35, #43, #44, #45, and #46 to reduce the likelihood of these trees being damaged by lightning strikes
- Recommended the nineteen (19) live oaks not proposed for removal implement a soil management program based on soil testing to correct nutrient deficiencies and/or toxicities that may be detrimental to plant health


Option Two:

If the City elects not to remove trees, the risk of trunk failure will remain *low* for live oaks #3, #24, and #25. Pruning to reduce the relative size of the crown on each tree may result in an estimated residual risk of low for branch/crown failure. These trees should have root collar excavations performed if they are to remain on site

> Option Three:

 If the City elects not to remove the trees, or prune to remove dead branches and reduce the relative size of the crowns, the risk of trunk failure will remain *moderate* for live oaks #8 and #45 and

low for stem failure for the other 20 live oaks. Each tree's risk may increase in the future as a result of not performing mitigation

- 2. Pave the Area of the Park immediately in front of the newly constructed Stage/Bandstand with permeable pavement, pervious pavers, or bricks
- 3. Move the Anchor from its current location South of E West Street to the area where the Stage/Bandstand use to be located and add a Buoy, a Stone Plaque to the area telling the Franklin Square Park story, and a statue of a Sea Captain





















- 4. Remove the existing Night Security Light and add appropriate Night Security Lighting throughout the Park
- 5. Formalize six (6) of the Designated Pedestrian Entrances into the Park that are not part of the sidewalk system
- 6. Close one (1) of the Informal and Unofficial Pedestrian Entrances into the Park to pedestrian traffic—the opening at the East end of the Park off the Franklin Square Art Gallery parking lot near the historical marker



7. Formalize three (3) of the Informal and Unofficial Pedestrian Entrances into the Park to pedestrian traffic—the two (2) off E West Street at the East end of the post and rope fence and at the end of the stone ballast, and one (1) at the opening at the corner of the Baptist Church on N Howe Street







- 8. Repaint the Pedestrian Crosswalk on E West Street
- 9. Install new Park Regulations Signage at strategic locations throughout the Park, particularly at the main entrances to the Park
- 10. Design a Park Interior Pedestrian Pathway and Walkway System
- 11. Plant St. Augustine Sod in bare areas within the Park that can and will Support Grass
- 12. Mulch the Bare Spots and Dirt Spots where necessary and Sod the Bare Spots and Dirt Spots and maintain Grass Areas where possible
- 13. Mulch all of the areas around the Trees and Shrubbery
- 14. Add an Irrigation System and Sod to the Northwest corner of the Park
- 15. Repair the Ballast Stone Wall where damaged

CHAPTER ONE: CURRENT INVENTORY OF AMENITIES AND ASSESSMENT OF CONDITIONS AT FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

This chapter provides an inventory of existing leisure and recreational experiences, opportunities, and amenities at Franklin Square Park. Franklin Square Park contains some impressive live oak trees, azaleas, camellias, other flowering shrubs, greenery, and bushes. Unfortunately, Franklin Square Park is also showing distressing signs of poor maintenance and possible overuse. Six (6) of the old Oak Trees within the Park had to be recently removed and several other trees significantly trimmed. Most of the former grassy areas in the central section of the Park have disappeared and now are nothing more than large bare dirt spots. Several of the entrances into the Park are in need of renovations as is the Stage/Bandstand. Overall, there are ten (10) formal and official entrances into the Park, four (4) historical markers, the Stage/Bandstand, an old capped well, a bike rack, nine (9) benches, a picnic table, four (4) trash receptacles, two (2) dogi pot litter bag dispensers, a ship's anchor, sections of a ballast stone wall, a paved sidewalk, six (6) lamp posts along the sidewalk, several informal entrances, several tripping hazards, and several unsightly power boxes.

Assessment of Conditions at Franklin Square Park

- Franklin Square Park
 - ◆ PRESENT CONDITIONS—the present condition of the Park is not good. The Park has not been well maintained in recent years and is showing significant signs of wear and tear to include but not limited to a weathered Stage/Bandstand, bare dirt spots in numerous areas of the park, exposed tree and shrubbery roots, a damaged ballast stone wall, and exposed ground pipes and other obstacles.
 - <u>UNDESIGNATED PARKING AREA</u>—The Undesignated and Unofficial Parking Area is a narrow dirt strip along the east side of E West Street which is only separated from the <u>Park</u> by a Post and Rope Fence. The area is used a lot by the elderly, disabled golf cart drivers. The area should be paved and marked for Handicapped Parking Only.



 FORMAL AND OFFICIAL PEDESTRIAN ENTRANCES INTO FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK—The six (6) formal entrances into the Park that are dirt or grass entrances are in need of beautification and improvement.



INFORMAL AND UNOFFICIAL PEDESTRIAN ENTRANCES INTO
 FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK—There are four (4) Informal and Unofficial
 Pedestrians Entrances into Franklin Square Park which in their
 current condition provide dangerous or inappropriate informal and

 access to the Park and should be enhanced and improved as such.


<u>CONDITION OF STAGE/BANDSTAND</u>—The existing Stage/Bandstand is in need of improvements and renovations. Although the wooden structure fits well with the rustic and natural appearance of Franklin Square Park, the wooden structure is showing its age and use. Some of the wood is beginning to rot and there is graffiti on some of the walls of the structure.




































<u>BARE SPOTS</u>—There are numerous large areas within Franklin Square Park that do not receive much sunlight and experience a great deal of human trampling which has created large and unsightly bare dirt spots within most of the central sections of the Park. These bare dirt spots are difficult for the elderly and handicapped to navigate and turn into mud spots during periods of precipitation. The lack of sunlight and the significant amount of foot traffic within Franklin Square Park make the cultivation of grass difficult but possible in specific areas of the Park.



 <u>EXPOSED TREES AND SHRUBBERY</u>—Almost all of the Trees and Shrubbery within <u>Franklin Square Park</u> are without any form of protective fence or barrier surrounding them which leaves them, particularly the large live oak trees, susceptible to root and trunk damage. This is especially true on the East side of the <u>Park</u> in the area of the "Four Sisters."



• <u>DAMAGED BALLAST STONE WALL</u>—The low-profile Ballast Stone Wall which runs the perimeter of the north and west sides of Franklin Square Park has received minor damage in some locations. The Wall's main purpose is historical in nature as it does not add or distract from the Park's appearance. Although the damage to the Wall is minor, it should be repaired and in some locations the Wall actually extended if possible around the Park perimeter.



 <u>NIGHT SECURITY LIGHTING</u>—The existing Night Security Lighting consists of one (1) Light situated in the Southeast section of the Park. The Night Security Lighting is unattractive, ineffective, and shines harshly into the Park.



- <u>UNSIGHTLY/POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS OBSTACLES</u>—There are several unsightly and potentially dangerous obstacles within <u>Franklin Square Park.</u>
- 1. There is an exposed pipe protruding from the ground on the north side of the Park which is leaking water and is a tripping hazard and not in character with the natural ambience of the Park.





2. There is an exposed pipe or irrigation head protruding from the ground in the center of the Park which is a tripping hazard and not in character with the natural ambience of the Park.





3. There is an exposed pipe protruding from the ground on the south side of the Park behind the Town Fire Department Building which is a tripping hazard and not in character with the natural ambience of the Park.



4. There is a thin cable leading from a powerline poll on Howe Street near the Baptist Church which is a tripping hazard and not in character with the natural ambience of the Park.







5. There is an unsightly power box and mobile generator next to the Fire Department Building.







6. There are four (4) other unsightly power boxes and poles in the more central portion and NE corner of the Park.









<u>UNDESIGNATED PARKING AREA</u>—There is a section of <u>Franklin Square Park</u> on the North side of the <u>Park</u> next to E West Street that is used for informal, undesignated, and potentially dangerous public parking.





<u>SHRUBBERY</u>—Some of the existing shrubbery in <u>Franklin Square</u>
 Park is in poor condition and in need of consistent and accurate professional maintenance including pruning and fertilization.



• <u>PEDESTRIAN CROSSWALK</u>—The pedestrian crosswalk on E West Street is faint and difficult to see.



 <u>INTERIOR PATHWAY SYSTEM</u>—The interior pathway system that existed at one time in the <u>Park</u> is essentially non-existent due to the bare dirt spots and lack of differentiation within the <u>Park</u>.



 <u>PATCH OF RED BRICKS</u>—There is a small patch of red bricks in the central part of the Park which appears to serve no purpose.



 <u>PARK REGULATIONS SIGNAGE</u>—The Park Regulations Signage is only posted at the Howe Street/West Street entrance into the <u>Park</u> and the sign is difficult to locate, weathered, and the wording impossible to read.



OUTDOOR BASKETBALL HALF-COURT—The Outdoor Basketball Half-Court is directly behind the City Gymnasium. The slab for the Outdoor Basketball Half-Court is approximately 70' x 70' in size. The slab for the Court is in need of repairs and remarking. In addition, the backboard for the Court is in remarkably close proximity to a Live Oak Tree.



OPEN SPACE AREA BETWEEN THE OUTDOOR BASKETBALL HALF-COURT AND E WEST STREET—There is an open space area between the Outdoor Basketball Half-Court and E West Street that is approximately 60' wide and 120' long from the East corner of the City Gymnasium to the Art Gallery parking lot. There is an additional open space area that runs from the north corner of the City Gymnasium to N Atlantic Avenue that is approximately 75' long, 50' wide at the north end and 33' wide at the south end near Atlantic Avenue and contains two (2) old Live Oak Trees. These open space areas are mainly used as vehicle parking spaces while individuals play on the Outdoor Basketball Half-Court and participate in other events that take place within Franklin Square Park. As a result, these open space areas are predominately bare dirt areas with a minimal amount of grass which holds water and turns into a muddy mess when it rains. In addition, the Live Oak Trees, including the "Four Sisters" are extremely exposed and vulnerable in this area.





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CHAPTER TWO:

PRIOR PARKS, RECREATION AND OPEN SPACE MASTER PLAN ASSESSMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK



 Plan Assessment for Franklin Square Park
 - Franklin Square Park lies within the heart and soul of the Southport downtown central business and tourist areas. It is the location for many special events and functions highlighting and celebrating the City of Southport throughout the year. The Southport Parks and Recreation Department's administrative offices and the city gymnasium are also located within the park's boundary. The park contains many large old oak trees as well as benches, an outdoor basketball half court, a large gazebo and stage area, a bike rack, picnic

areas, and the Franklin Square Art Gallery. Suggestions for improving the park include demolition and removal of the department administrative offices, the old city gymnasium and the basketball half court; construction of a new multi-purpose, comprehensive recreation center/administrative offices facility in the area vacated by the demolition and removal; the addition of several picnic shelters with grills; the placement of additional benches throughout the park area; adding a water fountain; adding several bike racks in strategic locations in the park; the construction of a small kiosk in the center of the park to be used to publicize departmental programs, services and activities; the erection of a decorative natural looking archway over the entrance to the park from Howe Street; the construction of a natural landscape buffer to shield the area from Howe Street; and, the placement of brick paver paths throughout the park and a brick paver deck in the open area in front of the large gazebo and stage area.



- - Franklin Square Park lies within the heart and soul of the Southport downtown central business and tourist areas. It is the location for many special events and functions highlighting and celebrating the City of Southport throughout the year. The park contains many large old oak trees and several magnificent azalea bushes as well as benches, a large gazebo and stage area, a bike rack, and a picnic area. The Franklin Square Art Gallery is adjacent to the park. Recommendations for improving the park include the addition of several bike racks in strategic locations in the park; the construction of a small kiosk in the center of the park to be used to publicize departmental programs, services, events, camps, and activities; the erection of a decorative natural looking archway over the entrance to the park from Howe Street; the formalization of the entranceways into the park; the renovation of the existing stage and the construction of a public restroom facility; the trimming and proper maintenance of the trees and azaleas; installing pervious pavers throughout the park to cover the dirt areas; the installation of Wi-Fi capability within the park; and the installation of cell phone charging stations in appropriate and strategic locations within the park.

CHAPTER THREE: PUBLIC INPUT AND CONSULTANT ASSESSMENT OF FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

A <u>Needs Assessment</u> is defined as a systematic exploration of the "way things are" and the "way they should be." A typical Needs Assessment is a four-step process:

- Perform a "Gap" Analysis to determine the "Need"—identify the "current state of affairs" and the "desired state of affairs." The difference is the "gap" or "need"
- 2. Identify priorities and importance
- 3. Identify causes of problems, threats and/or opportunities
- 4. Identify solutions and make recommendations

Chapter One of this report (Current Inventory of Amenities at Franklin Square Park) and Chapter Two (Prior Master Plan Assessments and Recommendations for Franklin Square Park) provide official historical and documented information regarding prior assessments and recommendations for Franklin Square Park and gives us a clear and understandable picture of the "way things were expected to be" and the "past state of affairs." Chapter Three, this chapter (Public Input and Current Needs Assessment for Franklin Square Park) provides the information collected from all present-day sources pertinent and important to an understanding of the current views, opinions, and expectations in relation to the "way things should be" and the "desired future state of affairs" and identifies "expectations and priorities." Chapter Four (Assessment of Expectations Versus Reality) identifies the "gap" or "need". Chapter Five (Franklin Square Park Proposals and Recommendations) completes the Needs Assessment process by stating the solutions, proposals, and recommendations.

<u>Community and Citizen Input on Franklin Square Park Needs and Priorities—Public Forum Meetings (2)</u>

Direct community and citizen input was generated and received at two (2) public forums conducted on July 17, 2024 and July 27, 2024. The July 17, 2024, meeting started at 5 pm and was held at the Southport Community Building with twenty-six (26) individuals in attendance. The July 27, 2024, meeting was held at Franklin Square Park with forty-one (41) individuals in attendance. The information received at these meetings was utilized to provide an understanding and assessment of the specific expressed parks, recreation and open space needs and priorities of the citizens of the City of Southport regarding Franklin Square Park. This input was then analyzed and synthesized along with other information to provide guidance and direction in the establishment of the final Franklin Square Park Operational Report and Site Master Plan.

Dr. Herstine, Ph.D., the consultant hired by the City of Southport to facilitate and lead the public participation sessions in the **Franklin Square Park** assessment process opened the meetings by welcoming the attendees. Dr. Herstine gave the attendees a brief summary of his background and experience and then asked the attendees to follow a few general guidelines. First, remember that we are first and foremost here to generate thoughts and ideas regarding a future **Operational Report and Site Master Plan** for **Franklin Square Park**, not to voice previous grievances. Second, keep the discussion positive—present ideas regarding what is wanted and needed at **Franklin Square Park** rather than complaining about something that did or did not happen.

Dr. Herstine led the first public meeting by asking the following questions:

- 1. What do you see as the EXISTING POSITIVE ASPECTS of Franklin Square Park that need to be protected and enhanced now and into the future? In other words, what about Franklin Square Park that exists today should we carry into the future as a part of the Operational Report and Site Master Plan?
- 2. What do you see as the EXISTING NEGATIVE ASPECTS of Franklin Square Park that need to be eliminated and discarded now and into the future? In other words, what about Franklin Square Park that exists today should be ended now and discarded into the future as a part of the Operational Report and Site Master Plan?
- 3. What do you see as the **FUTURE ASPECTS** of **Franklin Square Park** that do not exist today, but should exist and be added to the **Operational Report** and **Site Master Plan** and carried into the future?
- 4. What do you see as the MAJOR OBSTACLES to establishing a workable, suitable, and manageable Operational Report and Site Master Plan for Franklin Square Park?

JULY 17, 2024, MEETING (26 in Attendance—Appendix S):

- RECORDED COMMENTS
 - **EXISTING POSITIVE ASPECTS OF FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK**
 - ♦ The Trees in Franklin Square Park are a definite positive aspect of the Park
 - ◆ The Park is big enough for a lot of uses but also small enough to provide privacy
 - ◆ Franklin Square Park can be used for a lot of varied, different, and unique uses
 - **♦** The Park is especially beautiful in the Spring
 - ◆ Franklin Square Park is centrally located in the City and is easy to access
 - ♦ The trees and shrubbery in the Park are native plantings
 - ◆ Franklin Square Park has a lot of history which needs to be showcased and preserved
 - ♦ The Park has open spaces
 - ♦ Franklin Square Park is a quiet and beautiful place for private reflection
 - ♦ There is no other place in the City like Franklin Square Park

EXISTING NEGATIVE ASPECTS OF FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

- ◆ There seems to be an inability to understand who the Park is being built, operated and maintained for
- Users of the Park do not seem to know or care about the history and dynamics of the Park and must be educated to utilize the Park properly

❖ GENERAL COMMENTS REGARDING FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

- ♦ If Franklin Square Park is going to be restored it needs to be restored as a park and not as a Fair Ground
- ♦ The school children from the neighboring church eat lunch in the Park and are well behaved and mannered
- ♦ Historically, Franklin Square Park is supposed to be an open area in the City for all to use
- ♦ Franklin Square Park needs to be used as a Park for people
- ◆ There are other available venues in the City that can be used for events that are currently held in Franklin Square Park
- ♦ There should be no parking allowed on the Park side of E West Street nor in the E West Street median
- ♦ Whatever happens with Franklin Square Park it needs to be focused on the long-term operation, management, and maintenance of the Park
- ♦ One needs passion to have a successful vision

➡ The Stage/Bandstand needs to be totally replaced and moved to a different location within Franklin Square Park



An eight (8) member Focus Group met at the Indian Trail Meeting Hall to assist with the preparation of the **Site Master Plan for Franklin Square Park**. The Focus Group included stakeholders from four (4) City of Southport enterprises: the Friends of Franklin (Ms. Jeanne Potter and Ms. Cheryl Daniel), The City of Southport Forestry Committee (Mr. Scott Len and Ms. Roxie Smith), Downtown Southport Inc (DSI) (Ms. Peggy Popelars and Ms. Emily Humphreys), and the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (Ms. Stephanie Jackson and Ms. Emma Thomas).

 - ♦ It is very well visited and utilized
 - ♦ Franklin Square Park is the Hub of the City
 - ◆ The Stage/Bandstand is nice but definitely needs repair and upkeep



♦ There are great trees in Franklin Square Park



- ♦ The sidewalks make Franklin Square Park accessible
 - The Park can be accessed from all sides and angles











- ◆ Franklin Square Park was given to the City for four (4) reasons and designated for those four (4) reasons (Educational, Fraternal, Religious and Recreational purposes)
- ♦ The Park is highly visible in the downtown area
- ♦ The Franklin Square Park is beginning to recover and return to its natural state

EXISTING NEGATIVE ASPECTS OF FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK

♦ The Park is filled with unsightly bare spots and dirt spots











- ◆ There is a true lack of well-designed and designated pathways within the Park
- ◆ The Stage/Bandstand is in need of major repairs and renovation
- ♦ The City seems to have no plan for maintaining and managing Franklin Square Park

- ♦ Franklin Square Park needs to be restored to its original natural state
- ♦ Franklin Square Park needs to be a Garden Park without vendors
- ◆ Franklin Square Park can support festivals, events, markets, activities, and other community gatherings provided they are of a limited nature, managed appropriately, and the Park is well maintained on a regular and constant basis
- ❖ OBSTACLES TO ESTABLISHING A WORKABLE, SUITABLE, AND MANAGEABLE OPERATIONAL REPORT AND SITE MASTER PLAN FOR FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK
 - ♦ The City powers that be do not seem to really care about Franklin Square Park and what happens to it
 - ♦ There seems to be two (2) diametrically opposed views regarding how Franklin Square Park should be managed
 - ♦ There is no maintenance staff in the Parks and Recreation
 Department even though the Department needs and has
 requested its own maintenance personnel

Key comments and top recommendations from the Focus Group Session for Franklin Square Park in a non-priority order are the need to:

- 1) hire dedicated grounds maintenance staff for the Parks and Recreation Department
- 2) create a functional and regular maintenance plan for the Park
- 3) repair and renovate the Stage/Bandstand
- 4) improve and upgrade the Pedestrian Pathway system within the Park
- 5) eliminate the numerous bare spots and dirt spots throughout the Park
- 6) develop a realistic, workable, and functional Operational Plan and Site Master Plan for Franklin Square Park that protects Franklin Square Park while at the same time allowing community use of the Park for festivals, events, markets, activities, and other community gatherings

<u>Community and Citizen Input on Franklin Square Park Needs and Priorities—City of Southport Franklin Square Park Needs Assessment Survey</u>

A survey instrument entitled "City of Southport Franklin Square Park Needs Assessment Survey" was developed and administered through a combined effort by the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department staff (Appendix D). The survey instrument opened with the following: "The City of Southport Board of Alderman and the Southport Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee want to receive input from citizens about the revitalization of Franklin Square Park, along with the future use of this City facility. Franklin Square Park has been a part of Southport since the 1930's and is in need of improvements, renovations, and enhancements. Please help us develop a Site Master Plan for Franklin Square Park by answering a few questions for us.

PLEASE COMPLETE THE SURVEY BY MAY 30, 2024

Thank you for your cooperation in helping us sustain and improve Franklin Square Park!



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The survey instrument was distributed electronically via "Polco" and made available as a hard copy to all residents, tourists, and visitors of the City of Southport. A total of 1,154 individuals responded to the survey instrument. Of these 1,154 individuals, forty-six percent (46%) or 529 individuals stated they were a "Full-Time/Permanent Resident; own my own home; and pay City of Southport property taxes" and five percent (5%) or 59 individuals stated they were a "Part-Time/Permanent Resident; own my own home; and pay City of Southport property taxes. The official 2020 US Census Population for the City of Southport was 3,971 residents. The 588 individuals completing the survey who stated they were a "Full-Time/Permanent Resident or Part-Time/Permanent Resident; own my own home; and pay City of Southport property taxes represents a response rate of approximately 15% compared to the 2020 official US Census figure. This response rate of 15% gives the survey results a highly acceptable degree of statistical accuracy and validity. As a result of this statistical accuracy and validity, the survey results provide a solid confirmation of the community's desires, wants, and needs for Franklin Square Park.

One thousand one hundred and fifty-four (1,154) individuals responded to the "Resident Status" question with 529 or approximately 46% responded "Full-Time/Permanent Resident; own my own home; and pay City of Southport property taxes." Twenty-Eight (28) Individuals or approximately 2% responded, "Full-Time/Permanent Resident; rent/lease my place of residence." Fifty-nine (59) individuals or approximately 5% responded, "Part-Time Resident; own my home; and pay City of Southport property taxes." Four (4) individuals or approximately 0% responded "Part-Time Resident; rent/lease my place of residence." Two hundred and eighty-seven individuals (287) or approximately 25% responded "Live in the 28461-zip code, but NOT within the city limits or Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of the City of Southport." Ninety-two (92) individuals or approximately 8% responded, "Local Tourist; live within 1-hour drive." Forty-five (45) individuals or approximately 4% responded, "Tourist; live outside a 2-hour drive." And one hundred and ten (110) individuals or approximately 10% responded "Other." "Other" responses are listed in **Appendix E**.

Six hundred and twenty (620) individuals responded to the question "How long have you resided in the City of Southport?". Sixty-nine (69) individuals or approximately 11% responded, "less than 2 years"; 252 individuals or approximately 41% responded, "at least 2 years but less than 10 years"; 129 individuals or approximately 21% responded, "at least 10 years but less than 20 years; and 170 individuals or approximately 27% responded, "20 years or longer."

One thousand one hundred and fifty-four (1,154) individuals responded to the question "What is your gender?". Eight hundred and forty-eight (848) individuals or approximately 73% were Female and 296 individuals or approximately 26% were "Male."

When asked, "Which of the following best describes your household?," 1,154 individuals responded. Ninety-four (94) or approximately 8% responded, "Single with no children/grandchildren at home"; 28 or approximately 2% responded, "Single with children/grandchildren at home"; 398 or approximately 34% responded, "Couple with no children/grandchildren at home"; 213 or approximately 18% responded, "Couple with children/grandchildren at home"; 333 or approximately 29% responded, "Retired with no children/grandchildren at home"; 51 or approximately 4% responded, "Retired with children/grandchildren at home;" and 37 or approximately 3% responded, "Other." "Other" responses are listed in **Appendix F**.

The responses to the question, Please explain why you indicated "Have not visited/utilized Franklin Square Park or Rarely or Sometimes visited/utilized Franklin Square Park during the last 12 months" can be found in Appendix G.

The data from the Online survey was analyzed and synthesized along with other information to provide guidance and direction in the establishment of the final *City of Southport Franklin Square Park Report and Site Master Plan*.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC INPUT COMMENTS

The public input comments revealed consistent results often leading to the establishment of several diametrically opposed themes throughout the various stages of the public input process.

There were certain **positive themes** that were identified throughout the public input process such as:

- 1. the need for regular and proper maintenance of Franklin Square Park
- 2. the need to preserve and safeguard the trees and shrubbery within Franklin Square Park
- 3. the desire to keep motorized vehicles out of Franklin Square Park
- 4. the desire to see grass areas return to Franklin Square Park
- 5. the desire to see the trees and shrubbery within Franklin Square Park properly mulched
- 6. the desire to keep **Franklin Square Park** a positive component of the City of Southport
- 7. the desire to maintain the historical character and nature of **Franklin Square Park**

There were also certain **diametrically opposed themes** identified throughout the public input process such as:

- 1. What to do about the Stage/Bandstand—repair it and leave it where it is presently located? Or remove it from its present location within the center of Franklin Square Park and move it to a different location within Franklin Square Park?
- 2. Should the City continue to use the Stage/Bandstand in Franklin Square Park for concerts, festivals, markets, private events, community and individual gatherings, etc.? Or relocate the concerts, festivals, markets, private events, community and individual gatherings, etc. to another venue in Southport such as the Garrison Lawn, Bay Street, or Taylor Field?
- 3. Should a formal and dedicated pedestrian pathway and walkway system be established within Franklin Square Park? Or should the City leave Franklin Square Park as it currently is without a formal and dedicated pedestrian pathway and walkway system?

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC INPUT COMMENTS

Consultant Inspection, Analysis, and Evaluation of Franklin Square Park

Franklin Square Park Assessment—Franklin Square Park lies within the heart and soul of the Southport downtown central business district and tourist areas. The Park is in a square with is commonly known as Franklin Square, and bordered by N Howe Street, E West Street. N Atlantic Avenue and E Nash Street. It is the location for many special events and functions highlighting and celebrating the City of Southport throughout the year and is known as "The Tree-Studded City Hub for Events." The Park contains many large old live oak trees and several once magnificent azalea and camelia bushes as well as other flowering shrubbery, natural vegetation, benches, a large Stage/Bandstand area, a small picnic area, and undesignated natural footpaths. The Franklin Square Art Gallery is adjacent to the Park. Other buildings and amenities within Franklin Square include a Public Restroom, the Southport Baptist Church, the Southport Baptist Weekday Preschool, the Southport Fire Department Downtown, the Southport City Gym, an Outdoor Basketball Half-Court, the Southport Parks and Recreation Department Administrative Offices, the Masonic Lodge, and the Southport Trinity United Methodist Church.

An obvious observation is that the Park has not been well maintained over the last several years. The trees are not in the best of condition nor are the flowering shrubs. There is no grass growing in the main center of the Park and as a result there are numerous bare spots and dirt spots throughout the this central portion of Franklin Square Park. The Old Well Pump is no longer in operation. Several of the formal entrances into the Park are in need of repairs and enhancements. The night lighting system is harsh and ineffective. The existing Stage/Bandstand is in great need of repairs. Where there was once a system of pedestrian pathways and walkways, there is now no identifiable pedestrian pathways and walkways but a lot of bare dirt and soil areas that become very muddy and difficult to walk through after a rain.

There are numerous tripping hazards within the Park as well as several informal and ineffective pedestrian entranceways into the Park. Many of the live oak trees are exposed to vehicular traffic and parked vehicles which could lead to root damage and collisions with damage to the tree trunks themselves. The ballast stone wall is absent in several locations and damaged in other locations. In general, Franklin Square Park is in poor condition and in need of maintenance and repair and improved amenities and features.



CHAPTER FOUR: PROPOSALS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND IMPLEMENTATION

Before proceeding with the Proposals, Recommendations, and suggested Implementation Phasing for the Franklin Square Park project, it is important to discuss the circumstances and issues encountered during this process. The comments and information received during each of the Assessment Phases of this project highlighted the intense emotional response Franklin Square Park has generated in the recent past from all segments of the City of Southport population. Unfortunately, several of these emotional responses are diametrically opposed. For example, a significant number of individuals would like to see the number of programs, services, events, activities, markets, community and individual gatherings, etc. stopped at Franklin Square Park all together and moved to other locations in the City or at least greatly reduced if

continued at Franklin Square Park. An equally large and vocal number of individuals would like to see the number of programs, services, events, activities, markets, community and individual gatherings, etc. increased or at least remain at the same level at Franklin Square Park. A significant number of individuals would like to see the existing Stage/Bandstand moved to a different location within Franklin Square Park. An equally significant number of individuals would like to see the existing Stage/Bandstand renovated or replaced but remain in its current location within Franklin Square Park. An almost unanimous response during all of the Assessment Phases was the need for Franklin Square Park to be properly, consistently, and professionally maintained at all times under all circumstances.

The Franklin Square Park Operational Report and Site Master Plan are grounded in an analysis and synthesis of current background information for Franklin Square Park, an inventory, evaluation, and assessment of Franklin Square Park, and, the identification of citizen and participant needs, wants, desires, and interests. The Operational Report recognizes that the primary reasons for visiting/using the Park are to Enjoy the Shade Trees, Attend Concerts, Enjoy Nature/Outdoors, Enjoy the Azaleas/Flowers, Attend Social Events, and Attend Cultural Events. The Operational Report also recognizes that the major maintenance and management issues facing the Park are the Need to Restore/Protect Nature, that the Park is Not Well Maintained, that the Trees and Azaleas are in Poor Condition. Not far behind those compatible maintenance and management issues are the diametrically opposed ideas that More Markets/Vendor Opportunities and More Concerts are needed, AND that there Are Too Many Markets/Vendor Opportunities. THE ONE ISSUE AGREED UPON BY ALL IN ALL PHASES OF THE ASSESSMENT PROCESS WAS THE NEED TO RESTORE FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK AND THEN PROPERLY MAINTAIN THE PARK INTO THE FUTURE.

The recommendations of the Franklin Square Park Operational Report and Site Master Plan attempt to bring all of these ideas and concerns, whether compatible or diametrically opposed, together into a workable and operational plan and are designed to be planned and implemented over the next 4 Fiscal Year periods and could be funded from current appropriates, future appropriations, grants, gifts, donations as well as inkind offerings from civic and private sources such as the Friends of Franklin, the Southport Garden Club, the Forestry Committee, DSI, etc.












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FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK RECOMMENDATIONS

TO BE COMPLETED DURING THE 2024 – 2028 Fiscal Years

- ♣ Recommended Additions, Improvements, Modifications, Enhancements, and Implementation Schedule for Franklin Square Park:
 - ♦ Create a Building and Grounds Maintenance Division within the City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department which includes:
 - ❖ Facilities and Grounds Maintenance Supervisor (1)—Head of the Maintenance Division within the Parks and Recreation Department and supervised by the Director of Parks and Recreation. Responsible for the day-to-day supervision and management all other Maintenance Division employees and the maintenance and care of all City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department facilities, areas, and parks including Franklin Square Park
 - ❖ Facilities and Grounds Maintenance Specialists (4)—Work as a Crew of two (2) Maintenance employees supervised by the Facilities and Grounds Maintenance Supervisor. Responsible for conducting the daily maintenance and care activities for all City of Southport Parks and Recreation Department facilities, areas, and parks including Franklin Square Park (Appendix U)



- ♦ Complete and Follow the Recommendations Contained in the Tree Assessment Report by The F.A. Bartlett Tree Expert Company
 - Option One
 - Recommend removing live oaks #3, #24, and #25 entirely to remove the risk of root, root collar, trunk, crown, and branch failure. Grind the resulting stumps and back fill the holes. There will be no residual risk for these three trunks, crowns, or branches, but there may be a tripping hazard with the remaining roots, stump, or grindings that you will need to address for all three trees.
 - Recommend the remaining 19 trees be pruned to remove dead branches 2 inches and larger in diameter, reduce the spread and weight of their crowns, and thinned so that winds easily move through their canopies, reducing the likelihood of branch, stem, or root failure. Completing the pruning would resulting maintaining the low overall risk rating and reducing the likelihood of failure.
 - Recommend installing cables in the live oaks #35, #43, #44, #45,and #46 to provide support to co-dominant stems. Completing the installation of cables would aid in maintaining an overall risk rating and likelihood of failure.
 - Recommend installing lightning protection systems in live oak #5, #8, #16, #22, #35, #43, #44, #45, and #46 to reduce the likelihood of these trees being damaged by lightning strikes.
 - Recommend for the 19 live oaks not identified for removal implement a soil management program based on soil testing to try and correct nutrient deficiencies and/or toxicities that may be detrimental to plant health.
 - For all live oaks that remain, recommend an inspection interval of every 12 months and after major storm events
 - All recommended work should be performed by qualified arborists and in accordance with industry accepted standards and best management practices set forth by the American National Standards Institute and the International Society of Arboriculture.

OTHER RESPONSES TO "MAJOR MAINTENANCE AND MANAGEMENT ISSUES" FACING FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK (Q12)

- > The park was originally designed to be a passive, peaceful place for people to enjoy—not for commercial purposes! There are too many other places in SPT to have events & markets rather than destroy our historic park!
- The City has lost sight of what this historic Franklin Square was given to the City for. It was never meant to be an area for commercial business
- > The well is pretty dangerous. Keep it but change the terrain around it
- > Decades of neglect. Need annual funding in budget for routine maintenance. Not elimination of events
- > I do not know enough about those issues to respond
- > Needs to be more receptive to our citizens with disabilities
- > Stage could be updated and improved
- Park and Rec management has not done anything for soil or appropriate grass for the shaded conditions that see heavy traffic. They also have little involvement and getting park activities suitable for kids
- Trees, azaleas and shrubbery all look to be in poor condition. I recall a time when the greenery was lush, the azaleas and camellias were full of healthy blooms, the tree crowns were full and healthy, and the tree roots were not so exposed. And there was grass......not these large, exposed patches of dirt. The park was also home to squirrels and many species of birds
- ➤ 4th vendors, market vendors are great but even concerts just need to be in a larger open place like Tailor Field. I am a native. Tailor Field was great as I was a child—football, baseball, and 4th of July functions. Franklin Park is small, nice, nature and picnic area. Put it back the way it worked
- I do not believe you need fewer or more events in the park or that the craft shows and festivals are causing the problem. The park is a living, growing ecosystem often inhabited by humans. The vegetation and trees need continual maintenance to survive and thrive. Dead limbs need to be trimmed. In the circle of life, some trees may eventually die and need to be removed. But many old live oaks in Southport are surrounded by cement or pavement which must be worse than people walking in the park to attend events. There needs to be a balance of use and maintenance, but eliminating events in the park is cutting the heart out of Southport
- ➤ I love exactly what it has been used for and would love to see it simply well maintained for continued uses such as the markets and concert series
- > Trees and shrubs need to be maintained. The town had done nothing along these lines. Stop blaming it on events that take place in park
- I want the trees to stay. ALL of them. I grew up playing inside the 4 sisters' trees, climbing the ancient Oaks, playing tag under the canopy and to think any of them may be taken down because of an insurance company makes me sick
- > I think the park is great and the events are amazing for our community. If we just need more maintenance and care for the trees then let us do that.....but not take the park and events away

- ➤ When was the last time the beautiful Oaks were fertilized since no natural nutrients come from a constantly pristine ground giving trees a chance to mend and grow rather than cutting them down??

- > Tree roots are a hazard for pedestrians
- > Political and ridiculous ploy for attention for Alderman

- Too many sit-down events. The park should be used as a garden/walk through, not a place for large crowds to sit or booths to cover the park

There are MANY MORE venues available throughout SPT in which they could occur. Most craft fairs & markets are held on city streets or open fields. Moving the events downtown would benefit our merchants & restaurant owners, too
